Seasoning Speech

"Let your speech always be with grace, seasoned, as it were, with salt, so that you may know how you should respond to each person," Colossians 4:6. Paul argued that speech that is not attuned to the situation and audience is either insensitive or lazy. Criticism is wanted, even needed at times. But common sense, not to mention the Bible, tells us that different approaches are appropriate in different circumstances.

Season according to the person. Paul wrote, in a somewhat different context, "I have become all things to all men, that I may by all means save some," 1 Corinthians 9:22. We don't teach every person in the same way; why should we think we can criticize them in the same way? Some people respond to humor, some to subtlety, some to direct confrontation. We need to have the wisdom to know which salt shaker to use. Similarly, certain people are due a measure of respect because of their position relative to us. Parents should not be criticized in such a way as to dishonor them. Older people should be respected, 1 Timothy 5:1, as should overseers when criticism is merited, 1 Timothy 5:17-20.

Season according to the situation. You don't tell someone about their poor fashion sense at their mother's funeral. Some criticism can be shelved indefinitely; most can wait for an opportune moment. We should not use diplomacy as an excuse for avoiding necessary confrontation; on the other hand, we shouldn't use honesty as an excuse for rudeness.

Season according to our own mood. The right thing to say is not always the same after a ten cooling-off period. James tells us, "let everyone be quick to hear, slow to speak and slow to anger," James 1:19. Violating the second of three can keep us from keeping the first and third.

There's a reason restaurants have salt shakers at every table. They know that no matter how well seasoned their meals patrons sometimes want a little more. Let's make sure we err on the side of excess when we are seasoning speech. \Box

Paul wrote his letter to the Philippians while under house arrest. He couldn't travel, but the apostle could receive visitors. More than likely, though in a private residence that he was responsible to provide, he was chained to a Roman soldier of Caesar's elite Praetorian Guard in four six hour courses day and night. His case was on Caesar's docket, but he knew that a trial was years away. These were his living conditions for the foreseeable future.

Paul wrote not complaining but rejoicing in the opportunity, Philippians 1:12-13. One might have expected Paul under such circumstances to ask God for his release. Hadn't the Lord Jesus called him to preach to the Gentiles? Yet, now opportunities are diminished, he was stuck in Rome, unable to fulfill the shared apostolic commission, "Go preach." Instead an unjust imprisonment was hindering him from important work. How would one blame Paul for complaining in the face of persecution? Yet, he

It only make it look worse, until the problem looms larger in our mind than does our faith. On the other hand, when one takes his challenges straight to God, it brings a new perspective - "I'm not alone. God knows and cares. He is providing strength." Our God is bigger than any hardship. Through His strength, we rise above the difficulty, 1 John 4:4.

Our challenges can loom so large and unmanageable that they distort our narrow human perspective. The Lord invites us to live above our conditions by fixing our eyes on Him. The trials of this life shrink when compared to our loving, powerful Lord, who exercises His might in defense of His people.
