

People Are Significant

"During my second month of nursing school, our professor gave us a pop quiz. I was a conscientious student and had breezed through the questions, until I read the last one: 'What is the first name of the woman who cleans the school?" Surely this was some kind of joke. I had seen the cleaning woman several times. She was tall, dark-haired and in her 50s, but how would I know her name?

I handed in my paper, leaving the last question blank. Before class ended, one student asked if the last question would count toward our quiz

"Absolutely," said the professor. "In your careers you will meet many people. All are significant. They deserve your attention and care, even if all you do is smile and say hello."

I've never forgotten that lesson. I also

learned that her name was Dorothy."

One of the things that stand out in the life of Jesus is the value Jesus placed on people. He didn't just see everybody as a mass of humanity; he made an effort to know people on an individual basis. And as he came to know them, he acknowledged and met their needs.

Luke tells Bible readers the name of one of the people Jesus encountered — Zacchaeus. Most of us have been singing his name all of our lives. Isn't the story of Zacchaeus so typical of so many of Jesus' encounters? Luke 19:2-4. He was significant. Jesus took the time to show it. And, Dr. Luke made sure we knew it!

People deserve our attention and care, even those people who may seem to be "insignificant." By the way, do you know the name of the person who cleans your school or workplace? MICHAEL W. MCLEMORE **WORLD**" pencer Tracy starred in the 1963 comedy film,

"It's a Mad, Mad, Mad,

Mad world." The movie also stars some recognizable characters (if you're over 60) like Milton Berle, Sid Caesar, Buddy Hackett, Mickey Rooney, and Jonathan Winters. This colorful group of strangers are in a madcap pursuit of \$350,000 of stolen cash. Putting this group together naturally resulted in hilarity. It was all about money, and money makes people do crazy things; boy did it. But, the title of that 58 year old film seems especially descriptive of our own political and social climate — It's a MAD, MAD, MAD, MAD world! I added an extra MAD for emphasis!

Why is everyone so MAD? I have no motivation, nor do I feel any obligation, to solve the world's ills. Our duty is not to reform culture. Our responsibility is to instruct, encourage and attend to the souls of men and women in the mad world in which we live. So, how does the Christian respond to this mad world?

Paul implores the first century family of God at Philippi to "rejoice in the Lord" in any and in all circumstances of life, *Philippians 4:4*. His precise sentiment could possibly be formulated, "I will say rejoice in the Lord again and again! And, I will." The three admonitions that follow his encouragement ought properly to be connected to the spirit of rejoicing which is to govern the demeanor, temperament and assurance of the New Testament Christian of any age, including our own.

First, "Let your reasonableness (gentleness) be known

to everyone," 4:5. A gentle disposition of the child of God is an outgrowth of his or her joy in Christ. The King James Version translates the term "forbearance," which suggests the absence of bigotry and the addition of patience in our interpersonal relationships. Racism or prejudice against our fellow man is to be non-existent among God's people. Jesus demonstrated precisely this

Second "The Lord is at hand," 4:5. Every believer, no matter the century in which he lives, is impressed with the nearness of the Lord's coming and the looming judgement of the his immortal soul. It does not seem plausible that the second coming was immediately anticipated by the author of this letter. Some suggest a subtle indication of the destruction of Jerusalem. What application would this have for the Gentile Philippian Christian? This warning should be understood today, as then. Standing before the Lord for all is as near as the absence of your next breath. He is at hand! In view of eternity live every moment accordingly. How many of US want to be mad when the Lord returns?

Third, Paul said, "Do not be anxious" about ANY-THING, 4:6. Anxiety is an early subject of Jesus' sermon on the mount, Matthew 6:25-34. It is a very real challenge for every Christian. Note, Paul expresses the antidote to worry. Don't worry, be thankful! Worry pridefully looks within for potency and finds none. Thankfulness looks up in humility and finds God's omnipotent supply: "in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God," 4:6. Be anxious in nothing. Be thankful and prayerful in everything — Yes, even in a mad world! Especially in a MAD world.

Finally, Paul offers his readers the assurance "God will provide peace of mind, beyond human understanding," 4:7 (paraphrase, mwm). God's peace will guard your hearts and minds. The term "guard" is from the Greek phrouero, to surround and protect as with a military force. Anxiousness is allowed no entry where the power of Christ Jesus has made the rejoicing heart secure.

Paul said the cure for this mad world is joy. The world may be mad, but I can remain a kind and gentle spirit everywhere that I go in it. The Lord knows and "He is coming to judge the world in righteousness." My task is to be ready and watching for Him. Don't worry, just be thankful. If I do may part, God will provide the "peace of mind" no matter how mad, mad, mad, mad "my world" may be.

The Christian needs to frequently remind himself that "Christ also suffered for you, leaving an example, that ye should follow in his steps: who did no sin, neither was guile found in his mouth: who when he was reviled, reviled not again: when he suffered, threatened not; but committed himself to him that judgeth righteously," 1 Peter 2:21-23.
