Over seven hundred years before Jesus, the ancient prophet, Isaiah, promised God's people a kingdom that would be like no other place on earth, the church. It is available to you today!

Using the Israelite word for the city of God, Isaiah assured, "Zion shall be redeemed by justice, and those in her who repent, by righteousness," *Isaiah 1:27*. He promised a day in which divine justice would prevail. "In her," the church, God will redeem mankind by righteousness.

Listen to Isaiah – "It shall come to pass," *Isaiah* 2:2. He answers so many questions. When? "In the later days." What? "The mountain of the Lord's house." Where? "Established as the highest mountain and lifted above the hills." Result? "All nations shall flow to it!"

The Lord's promised house, Zion, is no ordinary place, *Isaiah 2:3-4*. It is a welcoming place –

I've taken pleasure in reading many Facebook comments and fielding phone calls over the last few days from Louis's former students. One by one they all reported of his profound impact on their lives. They described him as their favorite professor and the best Dean. Even those who found themselves in front of him for disciplinary decisions speak of his fairness, his generosity and his grace. Having served along side of Louis for the last almost 13 years I can attest that those attributes followed him all through his life.

Brother Garrett was a tremendous preacher. I think it can be properly said that "He went everywhere preaching the Word!" He preached for local churches all around the Tampa area during his time there. In North Alabama he preached for a number of years in Albertville and for many years he was our <mark>"go-to-guy" when the local pre</mark>acher was sick, out of town, or away in meetings. The response when Louis preached was always the same - "WOW, I bet that guy could quote the whole Bible!" Tommy Hill told me the story of his first introduction to Louis many years ago. He and Becky were living in Florida at the time and happened to visit one Sunday where Louis was preaching. Tommy was so impressed by Louis' sermon that he asked for permission to use it the next time that he was asked to speak where they worship. Brother Garrett calmly pulled his note page from his Bible and handed it to Tommy. The two never could have imagined that they would later serve together as elders for more than 15 years.

Personally, I loved to hear Brother Garrett preach and teach. Even when he preached in my absence, as a general rule I would listen to the recording of his work. It was first rate, always superb. Though, by his own admission, he was not as quick in these last years, he was a wonderful teacher and a great

Louis grew up in Ohio. He was poor enough that he remembered his mother preparing greens for the family meals from dandelion leaves. Who knew that was a thing? He cherished his Ohio heritage and spoke often of it. His own great faith in Christ can surely be traced to his early instruction in God's word. The Gospel's appeal was profound enough to keep him from pursuing a career in the law, as he had originally thought. Instead, Louis Wilson Garrett became a life-long student, a teacher and a preacher. He excelled in all.

Many know that Louis was a great fan of baseball, but few knew that he was actually a great pitcher in his time. "The boys" at Florida Christian College, where Louis served as a professor and later as Dean of Students, often admit their sound defeat in student-teacher baseball games because of Louis' prowess on the mound and at the plate.

Louis attended both Freed-Hardiman College and Florida State University where he began to prepare himself to preach the Gospel. He memorized reams of Scripture — the book of Romans, James and others were quickly committed to memory. It never left him. His son-in-law, Rod, mentioned in a correspondence a few days ago, "as Louis lay near death, he was be heard in low tones reciting Ephesians chapter one."

Brother Garrett, as I referred to him, was a master of the Word. He handled it with care and expected the same from any who took to the lectern, either in a class or sermon. I know he expected it of me. He struggled to restrain his displeasure when it was misused or if the teacher in his view was not adequately prepared. "He could do better," he once remarked to me after sitting through a poorly taught Bible class. Louis meant no disrespect to the man who taught it, he simply had very high expectations when it came to the proper handling of the Word.

Many at Weatherly first knew Louis Garrett as Dr. Garrett

preacher. He served our family well in his time and he is irreplaceable. He will be greatly missed. Weatherly Heights church of Christ has been mightily blessed by having had him as a member, elder and preacher.

In another way Louis played a very important role in the kingdom of God; not because of his faith, his work, his preaching or even his leadership.

Though he was most certainly important in those areas. Brother Garrett was our link back to many of the great restoration preachers, teachers and leaders of his youth. These men have been gone for generations, but they influenced Louis Garrett. He in turn influenced us for the better. We are indebted to Him.

One of Louis' closest colleagues and friends was Homer Hailey. They shared many years alongside of one another in study, in the classroom and in the pulpit. Margie edited many of Hailey's commentaries. I was thankful to have her edit one of my own published works. But Homer and Louis were also gym partners as far back as the 1950's. Unless you knew Louis well, you didn't know that he worked out lifting weights three days a week, late into his 80's. If you ever grabbed one of his biceps, you knew that he was very strong. It wasn't a matter of vanity, but I think instead it was a testament to his diligence in every worthwhile undertaking to which he placed his hand.

Louis was not a perfect man, far from it. He never claimed it; he admitted it. But Louis kept the faith. He not only preached "the grace of God," he relied upon it. Louis wanted to leave this world prepared to meet God. He spent his life preparing for that day.

And so, Louis and Margie are gone to be with God. I love them both. They made me better. I can not imagine life without them. I will miss them until I see them. I know you will, too!


