

The instructions didn't seem unreasonable. Taking the city of Jericho was no small assignment. Joshua needed guidance to be sure. He faced one of the most crucial moments of his life. But the instructions recounted in Joshua 6 came with a powerful assurance – "See, I have given Jericho into your hand," 2.

Joshua knew the outcome of the battle against
Jericho. The Lord promised him success. The specific
strategies God gave him for any military leader were
certainly atypical. But despite any concern they may
have felt, Joshua and the entire army believed the
Lord. They followed the unusual plan to the letter.

We will never be tasked to overthrow a fortified Palestinian city. But we will be called to obedience to God's Word. At times it might even seem to go against our natural reasoning. It is easy in those times to hesitate, rationalize, and then make excuses for why we couldn't possibly do what He says to do in this unusual circumstance.

Consider some areas where we excuse disobedience. We tend to hold on to our anxiety in spite of the command to "not be anxious about anything," *Philippians 4:6.* We hold on to the sins of others despite the charge "Forgiving one another, as God in Christ forgave you," *Ephesians 4:32.* We cling to things in contradiction of the clear admonition to set not "your hopes on the uncertainty of riches, but on God, who richly provides us with everything to enjoy," *1 Timothy 6:17.* We lament challenges rejecting the command to "Count it all joy, my brothers, when you meet trials of various kinds," *James 1:2.*

If the Lord charged us to take an insurmountable city, I think most would say, "Sign me up! I'm in."
But in lesser matters, that are not lesser at all, we fold and plead, "It's too hard!" or, "It doesn't make sense!" Remember Joshua. While God's directives don't always make sense, He insists they are for our good. Our job is to trust His wisdom and obey.

HITTING THE MARK

In the little booklet called *Daily Inspirations*, the following epigram arrested my attention: "You must aim to hit your goal; then pull the trigger," Jean War-Jones. It set me to thinking and resulted in this essay.

This epigram assumes the necessity for and importance of having a goal. Students of life have often noted this. Someone has said, "If you don't know where you are going, how do you know if you are headed in the right direction?" I might add this: Wen you get to a stopping place, how do you know if you are where you wanted to be? Another author said, "No wind is favorable to a ship without a direction." In the realm of the spiritual, Paul impresses upon us the necessity and importance of a goal saying, "I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus," Philippians 3:14. it has also been said that a certain person "hit what he was shooting at, nothing!"

Assuming one has a target — goal or aim, he must also have a gun. One cannot do target practice without a gun. In reference to life, whether in material or spiritual matters, each one of us has certain capabilities — some innate and some acquired. However, if one has a gun but does not know how to use it, he is not likely to hit his mark. Each one of us need to concentrate on learning how to use what he has. Too many aspire to do what they are not equipped by nature or acquisition to do, hence end up doing nothing. This has been emphasized in verse by an anonymous poet: "It matters not how the winds may blow, for it's the set of the sails and not the gales that determines the way we go."

Another consideration is the fact that we

must be sure the gun is suited to the target which we have selected as our mark. One does not hunt grizzly bears with a twenty-two rifle. This is to say that we should be realistic in setting our goals for ourselves in the realm of the spiritual.

Next, we must load our guns. This simply means that we must complement our capabilities with the energy necessary to make them practically effective in the attainment of our goals. It has been said, "It's not inspiration so much as it is perspiration that results in the attainment of our goals."

Having loaded the gun, it is necessary to take aim at the target. This suggests proper focus. Hunters call this sighting-in. Too many of us are "hit or miss" in pursuing goals. We do not consistently keep our eyes on our targets. This requires a high degree of self-discipline. The word of God refers to this as being "single-minded."

Last but not least, we must pull the trigger. This is best described by the expression "follow through." In a sports, following through is quiet as important as the approach. This is true in baseball, in golf, in basketball and in football. It is also true in moral and spiritual matters. Many goals are quiet laudable and the approach to their accomplishment classical, but the end is not accomplished because of a failure to faithfully follow through. We just fail to "pull the trigger." in congregational affairs, this is the cause of death of many praiseworthy endeavors. We have noble intentions, plan definitively, begin well, but fail to follow through, "pull the trigger." In conclusion, let it be noted that no runner ever won a race who did not finish it.
