Bible history, or history in general, should be viewed as a series of stories. It's the story of the lives of people, nations and cultures. I've always been fascinated by the stories of my aged relatives. I could sit for hours mesmerized by their fascinating tales. The people were real. This is history. At its core it is a reflection upon the reality of the past and people.

We all love to hear stories. Do we view the Bible as a story? Who better to tell the story of man than God? Open the Bible and read almost anywhere. We find God telling us the hard facts of sin, of consequences, of faith, of devotion and of reward. With perfect verbal dexterity the Omniscient lays before His readers the cold essentials. 

Naaman was a very successful man.

He was commander of the Syrian army, a great and honorable man in the eyes of his king, a victorious general, and a mighty man of valor. But, he had a terrible disease: leprosy. The record of Naaman is in 2 Kings 5:1-14.

# Lessons From a Leper

Naaman learned from a young Israelite slave girl that there was a prophet in Israel who could heal him of his leprosy. Naaman sought a cure for his leprosy. From his story we learn valuable lessons about our own need for cleansing from an even greater malady, sin. Naaman thought his healing could be purchased. When the King of Syria granted him permission to go to Israel, Naaman "took with him ten talents of silver, six thousand shekels of gold, and ten changes of clothing" 2 Kings 5:5. Apparently he thought he could pay someone in Israel to heal him.

Like Naaman, we cannot purchase our cleansing from sin. However, a price must be paid for our redemption, but not with "corruptible things, like silver or gold," 1 Peter 1:18. Christ paid the price for our redemption on the

cross. The Apostle Peter states that Christians have been redeemed "with the precious blood of Christ, as of a lamb without blemish and without spot," 1 Peter 1:19.

Naaman had an idea about how he thought his healing would take place. He said to himself, "He will surely come out to me, and stand and call on the name of the LORD his God, and wave his hand over the place, and heal the leprosy," 2 Kings 5:11. When the servant of Elisha the prophet told him to go and wash in the Jordan seven times, and his flesh would be restored

and he would be clean (v. 10), he became furious. His preconceived ideas concerning his healing were wrong.

When it comes to our own cleansing from sin, we must also seek God's instructions instead of what we might think would work. We must not approach God's word seeking to justify our current beliefs; rather, we must seek to know God's will through His word, and believe His word.

Naaman tried to substitute his own terms of obedience instead of the Lord's. He did not want to wash in the Jordan River. He asked, "Are not the Abanah and the Pharpar, the rivers of Damascus, better than all the waters of Israel? Could I not wash in them and be clean? So he turned and went away in a rage," 2 Kings 5:12, NKIV.

We must never try to substitute our own doctrines in the place of the teaching of God's word. Only through our obedience to His commands may we ever have the blessings attached to them.

Finally, Naaman humbled himself and obeyed the Lord's instructions. Naaman could see no logical connection between dipping in the Jordan River and being cured of his leprosy, but he obeyed. Obedience brought its reward: Naaman was healed.

A penitent believer in Christ may not see the logical connection between being baptized (immersed) in water and having his sins washed away, Acts 2:38; 22:16. Certainly, as in the case of Naaman, it is not the water that saves. It is God who saves us, when we obey Him. Obedience has its reward: the cleansing of our sins.

Will you obey?

## Delight in the Lord

It's not uncommon to hear someone say of their prayer requests: "God promised to give me the desires of my heart." Is this the meaning of Psalm 37:4? "Delight yourself in the Lord, and he will give you the desires of your heart." In fact, in context, this Psalm reveals the Lord's principle for purifying our desires of earthly concern. It's a call for devotion to Him. To "delight in the Lord" means to take pleasure in discovering more about Him and following His will. This aligns our heart's desires with His, which always puts us in position to experience His blessings.

In His sermon on the mount Jesus called for God to be the greatest passion of every believer's life, Matthew 6:19-34. We can't serve God and stuff. We cannot follow Christ and delight in the earthly. If we claim to love the Lord, our relationship with Him should have priority over possessions, vocation, and even other relationships.

Committing our way to God, we allow our thoughts, goals, and lifestyle to be shaped by His will and the things He loves. In other words, we acknowledge His right to determine whether our longing fits His plan. If we rest in the Lord and wait patiently for Him, we rely on Him to work out circumstances, even when the desire He's given us seems impossible. When He is our first love, our hearts become focused on making His glory known in our lives.

God wants to give us our heart's desires in His time, when we're aligned with His will and purpose for us as His children.


