

"What Can I Do?"

Most of us have asked someone in the recent past, "What can I do?" — A friend in need, someone who is wrestling with challenging event, or a benevolent need. We ask, "What can I do?" But I've often heard Christians lament, when it comes to the cause of the Lord or of a call to serve, and ask the same question for a different reason — What can I do? — as though they are unable to be or add any benefit.

It's actually a Bible question. It's asked a little differently from time to time – "Brothers, what shall we do?" *Acts 2:37*. What does the Lord require of me? What does He want from me in any and every circumstance? I think three things will always rise to the top.

PUT ON THE WORD – "What can I do?" Start off right by setting your mind right. Paul said, "Set your minds on the things that are above, not on the things that are on earth," *Colossians 3:2*. Distractions are the rule rather than the exception for most of us as Christians. It is

imperative for the Christian to follow the Lord's charge to "Seek first the kingdom of God," *Matthew 6:33*. If His word and His will are my default it will go a long way toward answering the daunting question, "What can I do?"

SHARE THE WORD – "What can I do?" Don't be afraid to act on an opportunity to turn conversation to God. "For I am not ashamed of the Gospel," Romans 1:16. Peter joined hands with Paul when he challenged every Christian to be "prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you," 1 Peter 3:15. The greatest need any person will ever have is Jesus. Preparation and willingness are essential. "What can I do?" Prepare and be ready.

BE THE WORD – "What can I do?" Exemplify God in your daily actions. "Only conduct yourselves in a manner worthy of the Gospel of Christ," *Philippians 1:27*. Be the example. Set the standard. "What can I do?" Be the word, personified. □

Bloom Where You Are Planted

ife has a way of getting in the way of human expectations. No person in biblical history demonstrates that reality more than Jacob's son, Joseph. Still, in spite of every barrier, he served God. He left the lasting lesson to "Bloom where you are planted." Learning that lesson requires faith and perseverance, and will never be possible unless we take three critical truths to heart, all from the beginning book of Genesis.

GOD'S WAYS ARE NOT MY WAYS

Born to Jacob and Rachel, Joseph was a component in the Divine plan, 30:23-24. He was the family's visionary of divine purpose, but at age 17 Joseph was cast into a pit out of his brothers' hatred, then sold to traders bound for Egypt, chapter 37. God placed him in the house of Potiphar where he became the Egyptian's own special servant. He bloomed where he was planted. But he soon became a target of seduction, falsely accused and cast into prison, 39. In prison he bloomed, where again he was a leader and a visionary, 40.

Joseph surely questioned "Why?" He never wanted to be in Egypt. He didn't do anything to deserve prison. Why, God? Why, me? In spite of all, Joseph was faithful. Joseph couldn't control his circumstance, but he could control how he responded in his circumstance. Each time without understanding what God was doing, Joseph served God and bloomed where he was planted, knowing that "God's ways are not my ways."

What did Joseph do when he was falsely accused? He bloomed where he was planted. In prison, at age 28, he was placed into the path

of two men, a baker and a wine taster, where he interpreted their dreams. He accurately told the men the meaning their dreams, 40. His only request was that his kindness be remembered. It would have been easy for Joseph to quit. It would seem natural to curse God. He did neither. He waited. He didn't become bitter, he bloomed where he was planted, until he was remembered.

GOD IS WORKING

God placed Joseph before the throne of the ruler of Egypt when he was 30 years old and raised him to the second in command of all the nation, 41. Joseph bloomed where he was planted. He served God and Pharoah for nine years before his brothers came to Egypt to buy grain. It was only then that he finally understood what God was doing, that God had been working all along – "As for you, you meant evil against me, but God meant it for good, to bring it about that many people should be kept alive, as they are today," 50:20. After all he suffered, 27 years later, Joseph finally saw that God had been working all along. He bloomed where he was planted.

Through one man, God preserved a nation. He used one sixteen-year-old boy to place His people where He wanted them. Every Christian should benefit from the story of Joseph's powerful lesson to bloom where we are planted. When life takes an unexpected turn, bloom where you are planted. When falsely accused or unfairly treated, bloom where you are planted. When your contribution isn't remembered or your talents go unnoticed, bloom where you are planted. It may be years later, but one day you will see what God was doing all along. \square
