Don't Be Carried Away

IP CURRENTS are powerful, narrow channels of fast-moving water that are prevalent along the Gulf Coast. They can move at speeds of up to eight feet per second, faster than an Olympic swimmer. This force overwhelms panicked swimmers trying to swim straight back to shore — putting themselves at risk of drowning because of fatigue. This force of nature is mirrored in the spiritual realm.

Peter warns the Christians of his generation and beyond to be on guard against attitudes and ideologies that would "carry them away" from truth — "You therefore, beloved, knowing this beforehand, take care that you are not **CARRIED AWAY** with the error of lawless people and lose your own stability, 2 Peter 3:17. "Carried away" is the Greek synapago. The word describes the force or impulse that moves a person away for God, destined to be spiritually drowned as a result.

The apostle forewarned of the danger of following the impulse of a thing until one's life begins to harmonize with it. Ironically Paul used the same term to describe Peter's unwholesome bias among the brethren in Galatia — "And the rest of the Jews acted hypocritically along with him, so that even Barnabas was <u>LED ASTRAY</u> by their hypocrisy," *Galatians 2:13*, *emp. mine.* The lawless impulse carried Barnabas away from truth.

Swimmers overwhelmed by rip tides are told to swim horizontally to the shore line until they are free from it's power. Christians would do well to heed the same advice — swim in the direction of the safety only found by praying for God's help, meditating on His word, repenting and turning to God through obedience. Practicing these spiritual disciplines defeats the powers of evil that carry us away, destabilizing our life.

No matter how far away from God you have drifted, He is waiting and longing for your return, *Luke 15:20*. Jesus assured every prodigal that you have a home. Whatever your drifting story, make this the day that you return.

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Jesus on Serving Two Masters

he Lord warned His mountain side listeners, "No man can serve two masters; for either he will hate the one and love the other, or else he will be loyal to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and mammon, *Matthew 6:24*. In this text, Jesus identifies the two masters men attempt to serve.

GOD — On one occasion, Iesus said that we should not call men Rabbi, Father, or Master, Matthew 23:7-10. Why should men not be called by these names? Obviously many do not know what Jesus said, or they do not understand its significance, or they are simply not interested in following His teaching. They use these words of men freely. Jesus explained why we should not use these titles: "For One is your Teacher," "One is your Father," "One is your Master." We do not use such titles because they belong to God.

It is imperative that each individual determine the place God will hold in his life. Ask yourself this question: On a scale of 1 to 10, with 1 being the most important in your life and 10 being the least important in your life, where is the Lord? It is sad but true, most people place God somewhere other than at the top of the scale. Even most religious people do not actually believe that Jesus must be the prime factor in their lives. This is the point Jesus made in Mark 12:28-30. He was asked, "Which is the first commandment of

all?" His reply was "The first of all the commandments is: 'Hear, O Israel, the lord our God, the Lord is one. And you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength'."

MAMMON — The original word used means more than mere money. Vine says, "a common Aramaic

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word for riches, akin to a Hebrew word signifying to be firm, stead-fast, hence, that which is to be trusted." *Volume III, 32*. Men have always put their trust in physical possessions. Eve trusted the forbidden fruit rather than God to make her wise. Cain trusted the fruit of the field rather than the commands of God to make his sacrifice acceptable. Solomon trusted in his riches rather than the teachings of God to make him happy.

Let's take a reality break. It is difficult to admit, but a dose of

honesty is not going to hurt and it might help. It is just too easy to push the Lord down the scale because of other things that we want. When we sleep late on Sunday morning we think God is supposed to understand. When we have to work so much we cannot study the Bible and pray, God is supposed to understand. Some are even heard to exclaim when they are unfaithful to their mate, drink alcohol, ad infinitum, "Only God knows what I'm going through." We must acknowledge: "You cannot serve GOD and MAMMON." whoever or whatever that is to you!
