hat happened to faith at Nazareth? Mark records the response of its citizens in the synagogue when Jesus returned and openly revealed His place and purpose in God's plan, Mark 6:1-6. Most readers center consideration upon Jesus' statement, "A prophet is not without honor, but in his own country, and among his own kin, and in his own house," 6:4, KJV. Focus instead upon a single word used by the Holy Spirit in this familiar recounting - thaumazo, (thou-mad'-zo, Gk.), "marveled." Jesus "marveled because of their unbelief."

The term is used two other times in the Gospels, Matthew 8:10 and Luke 7:9, to describe Jesus' response to the faith of a Roman soldier, a Centurion, as he begged the Lord to heal his beloved servant — "Jesus marveled."

Note the contrast of two faiths: At Nazareth, a people who had grown up in nearness to Jesus, who had observed him, known him intimately, and heard his voice, knew almost nothing of

Him — Jesus "marveled." Another, a man who represented the pagan arm of domineering Tiberius, whose sole role was to keep the Jews under Tiberius' rule, and was altogether unassociated with Jesus, had greater faith than all of Israel; again "Jesus marveled."

The Centurion recognized the divine holiness in Jesus and sinfulness in himself. He knew he was not worthy of Jesus' presence. He further appreciated Jesus' authority, the power of His word to command all things, while those who all their lives lived in nearness to God's Word, were altogether oblivious to its implications for their lives. How sad.

The two uses of a single word ought to give God's people cause for pause. It is entirely possible for people to grow up with access, and yet be unimpressed with the Lord, and our faith to be surpassed by those who have known almost nothing of the Lord. We would do well to rethink our own "faith in Christ" and "the power of His word." We must ask, "Which am I?"

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ost of us know that excellence doesn't come through shortcuts or along the path of least resistance. By its nature, quality requires exacting standards and attention to detail.

"Till Death Do Us Part"

A relationship maintained over time is costly.

So premium products cost more. More has been invested in them, so their value goes up. We understand that about companies, products or services. But, isn't the same true with relationships? Not only does it take effort just to keep up with someone when both of you are building careers but it also requires even more to deal with personality quirks, misunderstandings, and slights. Lacking the willingness to pay attention and to invest emotional energy, friends become mere acquaintances – and eventually become strangers all over again.

Ever wonder why Scripture represents the church as the family of God? Why it pictures its members as sisters and brothers to one another? Maybe your cynical response is to say it is because we are so much like children fussing in the back seat in the family car. Granting that, the deeper truth is that we belong to one another in a significant way and are expected to look out for one another in a pinch, to take up for one another when the neighborhood bully (*i.e.*, Satan) comes calling with the sinister intent of doing real harm to one of us.

The most intimate of human relationships is the one between husbands and wives in our marital covenants. With sociologists telling us that about half of all first marriages are failing, something must be wrong with our thinking. Where is the "excellence" we are building into our roles as



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mates and parents?

Research tells us that "till death do us part" has been laid aside as an archaic convention in wedding ceremonies of late. In its place are things like "for as long as our love shall last" or "until

our time together is over." How's that for being open-ended? For leaving a way out? For some people, what they call "love" doesn't last into the third month. Their "time together" is hardly enough to unpack.

"Make it easy on yourself" seems to be the rule of thumb for too many today. So in our culture relationships begin with low expectations. Where is the excellence? Among the people of God it must not be so! Have we become shallow in our faith, careless about our character, and weak in our commitments? May it never be! We must not betray our spiritual potential. How can we abandon the Divinely appointed path?

Paul charged, "Put on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, compassionate hearts, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience, bearing with one another and, if one has a complaint against another, forgiving each other; as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. And above all these put on love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony. And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts," Colossians 3:12 -15.

The world may abandon the divine pattern for marriage, but God's people must holdfast and not forsake our highest ideals. True enough, we may still fall short of our goals. But we will never achieve them on the path of minimal effort. For the children of God "till death do us part" is not just a goal, it is the divine pattern of God. \Box

Wasting Words?

W/ hen Jesus invited his disciples to breakfast, John inserted a very strange comment: "Now none of the disciples dared ask him, 'Who are you?' They knew it was the Lord," John 21:12. What an odd thing to say! They didn't recognize him?

Yes, they did, but not because of his voice or appearance. What clued them in to who this was? The fish! When John saw the nets fill with fish, it hit him: "It is the Lord!" *John* 21:7. John doesn't elaborate at all on why Jesus was hard to recognize. So why is it important?

Let me give one reason: the disciples' experience of not recognizing Jesus corroborates other independent post-resurrection reports, *i.e.* the two on the road to Emmaus, Luke 24:13-35.

What happened in John 21 is similar. The seven disciples didn't recognize Jesus until he revealed himself in a familiar act: filling empty fishnets. They are two independent, different reports that corroborate testimonies, increasing the credibility of both reports.

We would do well to pay attention to the oddities in the Bible. Seemingly extraneous things are not extraneous at all. What they have to say is important because God chose to include them. Tonsils, appendices, and "junk DNA" are not anatomical nonessentials. God doesn't waste words.
