seems such a common problem that we read things into what people say or don't say when they never intended, implied, or meant what we are assuming. We talk past each other due to assumptions rather than carefully listening, giving the benefit of any doubt, and attributing the best meaning to what others are trying to communicate.

This aspect of communication, as with other ways in which we treat people, also falls into the category of treating others as we want to be treated, Matthew 7:12. Love does no harm.

We don't appreciate when people assume things about our meaning and intentions when we mean and intend

something other than what is being assumed. Then, because of bad assumptions, we are pushed back on our heels trying to defend our original intent when we should not have had to do so in the first place. Such defenses are then viewed with suspicion and the communication level drops


into the gutters.

Communication is difficult. We've all struggled with saying the right thing in the right way only to find that we miscommunicated something. It gets worse when someone mis-hears or mis-reads what we are trying to say and then assumes the worst possible interpretation of it. We need some mercy and grace in communication. Christians, especially, should start by assuming the best interpretation of what someone is trying to say. Seek clarification when needed, but responding based on bad-faith assumptions will likely result in a devolving conversation and bitterness.

Love assumes the best. If I want others to think the best of what I'm trying to say, then I need to start by assuming the best of what they are trying to

Then, it makes me wonder, given how communication is so often misunderstood, how much we do this with God's communication to us. If we read Scripture the way we often read what others have to say, then we may be in serious trouble in understanding God's word.

In all of the rhetoric, argumentation, and conversation of today, let us take a step back before assuming the worst and firing off cutting responses. Whether it be someone's post, someone's response, someone's speech, or, most importantly, the word of God, we need to listen patiently and lovingly. We'll all be better for it. □
